Father Jacob's Homily for the Thirty Second Sunday in Ordinary Times.

Whenever we read today's gospel there is a tendency to make a judgment about people who are donating to the church. St. Mark may not have any such intentions in his mind when he introduced this episode into his gospel. This brief episode carries some important truths to us.

First, God looks into the hearts of the people. God always judges a person. We look at the actions of the people and judge them by giving rewards or punishments depending on the actions of a person. We have a few very good examples from the Bible. The Lord, when he selected David as the King of Israel said this clearly. David was the last among the sons of Jesse. In the book of I Samuel we read, when the prophet Samuel saw Eliab, the eldest son of Jesse, he said to himself, "Surely the Lord's anointed is here before him." But the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not judge from his appearance... I have rejected him… man sees the appearance, but the Lord looks into the heart." The appointment of Peter as the head of the Church and the call of St. Paul are against the judgment of others.

Secondly the story of the widow's generosity is well placed at this stage in Mark's gospel. The poor woman typifies what Jesus will do himself – give everything as an offering to God. When Jesus is finished giving there will be nothing left for him to give. The two small coins make up the total of her resources. She could have kept one. She doesn't. Her reckless generosity cannot be bettered. For Jesus, true generosity is measured not by what people give but by what they have left after they give. When Jesus gave himself to his Father as a sacrifice on the cross, He left nothing for himself.

The offering of the poor woman is not only a mere giving to the Lord but the total emptying of herself also, for which every Christian is called. Every day demands are made on us. We are called to be generous with our love, our forgiveness, our patience and our resources. The Lord asks of us for total commitment to our family, to the job, to the church and to the nation. At the end we must be totally empty.

The few coins she placed in the poor box expressed a level of sacrifice and generosity others were unprepared to give. It is always tempting for us to substitute external gestures for inner conversion. The opposite extreme, of course, is to claim an inner conversion that never sees the light of day in how we live. These are both temptations we face today. The first seeks external conformity to the practices of faith with a heart to which the faith is a stranger. The other, Jesus is in our heart but not in our daily life.

There is another way of giving ourselves that we may not think of as fulfilling the great commandment of love. It's doing our job. Most jobs have an element of service that challenges the idealism and integrity of the worker. Some of our day-to-day problems come from lack of integrity. Jobs are poorly done. Promises are not kept. These things happen because people don't take pride in their work.

Finally, in the middle of the nation of Israel, which was so frequently unfaithful, there was a small group of people called the "holy remnant" who kept the faith vital and alive. Widows and orphans often symbolize them. These are people who had been cleansed by the difficulties of life and knew their dependence was ultimately on God. They were the spiritual heart of the nation.

We can be like that widow and rest of the holy remnant for our church and our nation. For our church and nation can be a place where the truth of Jesus Christ and His grace are alive and well. Let us be part of that holy remnant, giving the word of God to for all, living our faith, uniting with both the head and the body of the church.

We can be that remnant, as the place of that light burns so that people can turn to us to rediscover their soul and to redefine their life.
