Sixth Sunday of Easter B 2024

If we bring together the readings of the three Sundays together 4th, 5th, and 6th Sundays of Easter we will get a clear picture of our relationship with Jesus and ourselves. The caring, forgiving, and sacrificial love of a good shepherd transformed us to children of God. The intimate and living bond between the vine and the branches help us to remain with Jesus to produce much fruits undergoing the trials of purifications. The quality of the fruit depends on the sap that flows from the vine to the branches – the transforming love of God our Father.

We heard from the first letter of John, "God's love was revealed among us in this way, God sent his only Son into the world so that we might have life through him. In this is love; not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as explation for our sins." (1john 4: 9-10). He loved us and He loved the world because He is love. God loved us first, asked and invited us to remain with Him in and through Jesus His only Son to have eternal life with him. Jesus said to his followers "It is not you who chose me but I who chose you" As the Father loves me so also, I love you. No one can show greater love than to lay his life to his friends." Paul explains it little more elaborately, "Indeed it is only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us." This is the sap that flows from the vine to the branches to produce the fruits of love. For St. Paul insisted in one un-forgetful passage, "If I understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith so as to remove mountains but do not have love, I am nothing" (1 Cor 13:2). Nothing, I simply am not.

Real love, Christ's kind of love, is not the feeling but an act of the will, a decision, a commitment to act for the benefit of an another no matter how we feel about that individual. Here the Lord is commanding us to love others even those we don't particularly like. Christian love is a decision, a commitment to serve a person's spiritual benefit, whether we like that individual or not.

The confusion of loving and liking may cause many problems today. If we identify married love with romance (feeling) is that a realistic basis for a lifelong marriage? Is the degree of emotional attraction between two people a guarantee of fidelity? Are we willing to base our life on another's feelings? When feelings start to change, does that mean that the marriage is at an end? Or could that signal the beginning of a new, more mature, and honest relationship? If we identify our spiritual life with religious feelings, what happens when those feelings pass as they invariably do? Do we cease being disciples? Does that mean that the Holy Spirit is no longer with us? Has our baptism into Christ evaporated? Could that possibly be the start of a more mature commitment to Christ that is not dependent on emotion?

If we read today's gospel by seeing love as a decision, a commitment and a mission, a new world of Christ – like living opens up for us. In a time when people are governed so much by emotion and passion the gospel calls Jesus' followers to something more realistic, more healthy, more mature, and beneficial – "love one another as I love you". This kind of love has great power to transform our world and great power to transform us too. This is a mission that can fill and fulfill a lifetime.

Again, Jesus says, "It was not you who chose me, but I chose you." It may be a surprise for us to hear that. God has an eye on each of us before we heard about him. God chose us to love others as Jesus loved us. The final result of this love is in Jesus' words, "I have told you this so that my joy be in you and your joy might be complete." St. Augustine once asked of this question "What is love"? Without giving metaphors or comparisons he wrote, "Love has hands to help others. It has feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of others. That is what love looks like." Love is virtue, art, gift.

This is what Jesus wants from us that his love should flow from our hearts, and we are to be joyful Christians.

BIBLE STUDY – Our current Bible Study sessions will conclude in May, and we will take the summer off before starting up again in September with the study of the Book of Revelations.

Perhaps no book of the Bible fascinates people more than Revelation. Yet relatively few people have studied it, especially from a Catholic perspective.

. *Revelation: The Kingdom Yet to Come* is an intriguing eleven-session study program that shows how the kingdom established by Christ in his Church is intimately connected with the kingdom of heaven. In this study, presenter Jeff Cavins pulls back the veil on the rich symbolism present in Revelation. Discover what the mysterious figures and images of Revelation mean and see how Revelation is more than an apocalyptic vision of the "end times." Explore the Church's teaching on the second coming of Christ and the Last Judgment. Understand how God, the Divine Bridegroom, and the Church, his spotless bride, enter into a heavenly, holy, and mystical marriage every time we celebrate Mass. The DVD sessions will cover;

- 7. Revelation 12-13: The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly
- 8. Revelation 14-15: Praising the Lamb
- 9. Revelation 16-18: Seven Bowls of Judgment and the Fall of Babylon
- 10. Revelation 19-20: The Marriage Supper and The Great Judgment
- 11. Revelation 21-22: A New Heaven and a New Earth
