The **image of the Divine Mercy** is a depiction of Jesus Christ that is based on the Divine Mercy devotion initiated by Sr. Faustina Kowalska. According to Kowalska's diary, Jesus told her "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I also promise victory over enemies already here on earth, especially at the

hour of death. I myself will defend it as My own glory." (*Diary* 48) The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday.

# **BLESSING OF THE EASTER BASKETS**



The Blessing of Easter Baskets tradition will take place on Saturday, March 30<sup>th</sup> at 9 am.

The blessing of the Easter baskets is a tradition on <u>Holy</u> <u>Saturday</u>. The tradition dates back to the 13-14th century in its earliest form. The basket is traditionally lined with a white linen or lace napkin and decorated with sprigs of boxwood, the typical Easter evergreen. Baskets containing

a sampling of Easter foods are brought to church to be blessed on Holy Saturday. After the blessing, the baskets of food are then set aside until Easter morning. Join us in this time-honored tradition this year.

Palm Sunday celebrations remind us of the royal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem which has some Old Testament references. In those days kings preferred to ride on a donkey in times of peace and during wartime on horseback. 1 Kings 1: 38-41 describes how prince Solomon used his father David's royal donkey for the ceremonial procession on the day of his coronation. Jesus entered the Holy city as a king of peace, fulfilling the prophecy of Zachariah.

Jesus was given a royal reception usually reserved for a king or military commander. 1 Maccabees 13:51ff describes such a reception given to the Jewish military leader Simon Maccabaeus in 171 BC. 2 Maccabees 10:6-8 refers to a similar reception given to another military general, Judas Maccabaeus, who led the struggle against the emperor, Antiochus Epiphanes, and liberated the temple from pagan control in 163BC.

The "Pass Over" lamb which was sacrificed by the High Priest was taken to the Temple in a procession four days before the main feast day. On Palm Sunday, Jesus, the true Paschal Lamb, was also taken to the Temple in a large procession.

There are a few points that we can reflect on Palm Sunday today. The evangelist shows us the glory of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. He knew that this would mean his rejection and death. Why did people reject him? Because he disappointed them. He was supposed to be a triumphant figure, leading his people in a return to glory, but he had let them down. Now he stands before them and their enemies, helpless, judged and condemned. So, they said, "take him away." We face the same challenge they did. If God does not come up to our expectations, do we reject him or question him? We expect him to do everything what we wish including our salvation.

Secondly, we have a Jerusalem ahead of us. For us it may not be a city, but it might be an illness, a change in our life, a problem, challenge, or an uncertainty ahead of us. Jesus shows us how to move toward our Jerusalem. As with Jesus, many people who say they will be with us probably will not be. Yet, we must move forward, facing whatever lies ahead, knowing that Jesus has been there before. We are not entering our Jerusalem alone. Jesus has been there.

Thirdly, it was not Jesus who looked for the cross; it was the world that looked to the cross as a way to eliminate him. The cross was not the idea of the Father, it was the final solution thought up by the world opposed to Jesus' way. Love does not demand the cross, but in the life of Jesus love ends up on the cross. That is what actually happened. Love chooses not to avoid the suffering that emerges from its commitment.

In his humility and love Christ entered the dark regions of our fallen world for our own sake, that he may raise up to himself. The key lies in his total obedience to his Father, the sacrificial opening of his heart in love, even in the midst of rejection and death, the emptying of himself so that God could fill him with his love, a love that could overflow, and touch the lives of everyone.

As we begin this Holy Week that recalls the great events of our redemption, let us ask the Lord to give us the grace, the strength to face whatever is ahead of us. Jesus shows that the cross, whatever forms it takes in our life can lead us to salvation and new life. Palm Sunday and the Passion teach us that whatever lies in our future, Jesus has been there first. He knows and shows the way that will lead us to Easter.
