Fifth Sunday of Easter B 2024

John's gospel uses few imageries to explain the relationship between Jesus and his disciples such as Shepherd and sheep and Vine and branches. The imagery of vine goes back to the Old Testament where Prophet Isaiah (5:1-7) presents us with a



song about a vineyard. Everyone knew that the vineyard was an image for a bride. It says that the friend had a vineyard and rich soil, planted choice grapes on it, and did everything he could make them then flourish. The vineyard was a disappointment, and instead of choice fruits, it produced wild grapes. The audience understands what that means. The bride was unfaithful, disappointing the trust and hope, disappointing the love that the friend had expected. The friend handed over his vineyard to be plundered. Suddenly it becomes clear that the vineyard, the bride, is Israel – it is the very people who are present. God gave them many gifts, but they did not produce any fruits.

Jesus says I am the vine, and you are the branches. I am the true vine, and the branches abide in me will bear much fruits. This vine can no longer be uprooted or handed over to be plundered. We are the branches and life of the Vine is passing or flowing into the branches so that because of the life of the Vine branches are also alive. There are few key words that are connected with vines and branches – remaining, purification, commandments, love, fruits, unity.... Remain with the plant in good and bad times. Abide in him in moments of great financial need, when we see dishonest people succeed, in times of great illness, when one of the children is about to fail in an important endeavor... Jesus says remain in me. Verse 7 speaks of prayer as an essential element of this remaining. Those who pray are promised that they will be heard. Of course, to pray in the name of Jesus is not to make an ordinary petition, but to ask for the essential gift that Jesus characterizes in the discourse as Joy while Luke calls it the Holy Spirit, two being ultimately same.

Another important element is purification. The Church and the individual need constant purification. Process of purification which are as necessary as they are painful, run through the whole history, the whole life of those who dedicated themselves to Christ. The mystery of death and resurrection is ever present in these purification.

The goal of purification is fruit, the Lord tells us. Purification and fruit belong together. And fruit and love belong together. The true fruit is the love that has passed through the cross, through God's purification. Remaining is an essential part of all this. The power of this indwelling and the shaping of life force is bound up with the word, and with the sacrament of the fruit of the vine – the Eucharist. The good Lord in this Eucharist helps us to remain in him and produce much fruits, keeping us together in the word and the Eucharist.

Sometimes in their good times people may say "I don't believe in religion or God. I believe in myself." Others say, "A lot of us feel that we don't have to lean on religion. We think for ourselves". But Jesus says, "I am the Vine, and you are branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing." At certain stages people may think whatever we have in this world or in our lives can save our lives. But they are given to us to sustain our lives or to survive here. There are times in the lives of people when any of those things that they depend on cannot do anything in their lives. Then they turn to God. If we get that knowledge before, we feel total helplessness, it is wisdom. This is the meaning of what Jesus said, "Without me you can do nothing."

There are many words of Jesus that point to this life or living in Christ. Jesus says, "No one can come to the Father except through me." "One who believes in me will never die; even if he dies, he will live forever." Paul says, "It is not I who lives but Christ lives in me." These words are not mere theology but life in Christ or the effects of the life in Christ.

- 9. Revelation 16-18: Seven Bowls of Judgment and the Fall of Babylon
- 10. Revelation 19-20: The Marriage Supper and The Great Judgment
- 11. Revelation 21-22: A New Heaven and a New Earth
