#### Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Cycle B 2024

The disciples of Jesus were sent as missionaries, before and after his resurrection to proclaim the message of freedom and hope. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians says the message that they preached; "It is in Christ and through his blood that we have been redeemed. Through him we gain our freedom, forgiveness of our sins and the pledge of future glory." This blessing and message come from God. God has blessed us with all spiritual blessings from heaven in Christ. He planned from the very beginning to reveal the fullness of his love in Jesus, who is at the very heart of the plan of salvation. Through the ministry of the disciples, through their message of repentance, healing and the authority over the unclean spirits a new sense of value is given to the listeners; "I will hear what the Lord God has to say, a voice that speaks of peace, peace to his people. His help is near to those who fear him, and his glory will dwell in our land."

In today's Gospel Jesus sends His disciples as missionaries to preach the Gospel and gives them few instructions. There are three instructions of Jesus in this Gospel that we can take to heart: carrying the walking stick, traveling two by two and shaking the dust from unresponsive towns. Each of this evokes three important helps to the Christian life to help us on our way to heaven.

First, we have the walking stick. The Lord tells his disciples to take no food, no traveling bag, or even any money. The one thing they were to take was a walking stick. The Lord knew they would need something to lean on. The hills were steep, and the roads were rough. A walking stick would help them to keep their balance. Our walking stick is a trust in God's providence. This is critical to our Christian life. We need to trust in God's will. Very little in our life is simply coincidence. God's will is woven into everything that happens to us, even in rejection.

In our life, everything happens for a reason, for our spiritual good, if we can see it through the eyes of faith. Planted within every event, every failure, every rejection is a seed of a new turn, a new life, a new direction, new grace. That insight has enormous transforming power for looking at our life. It can give great confidence and peace. That is a powerful walking stick on which we can lean. When we cannot discern why things happen the way they do, there is trust we have in God's will and God's providence on which we can lean and rely. That is our "walking stick" that will help us wherever we go.

The second element of Jesus' instructions is His sending out disciples two by two. If they went out alone, they would, of course, reach more places. But the Lord sends them out two by two for the very obvious reason that they needed each other. They had a big job to do and to get it done well they needed teamwork. We all need friends, partners, associates and companions. That is certainly true of the spiritual life. We call that the communion of saints. We ask for the help of the saints.

We also need partners in our life as Christians here on earth: people to whom we can talk, seek support, and on whose prayer we can rely. That is what the community of Church is for. That is also why Sunday Mass is important. If we must work in a non-Christian environment, we can gather each week with the Church to renew our faith, our commitment to the Lord, and know that we are supported by prayer. In short, we need friends, people to whom we can talk, to seek support, to share openly and on whose prayers, we can rely on. It is a great feeling that we belong to a loving and caring family.

The third and last instruction from the Lord to His disciples is to shake from their feet the dust of a town that will not listen and move on. The message for us and for the Church from these words of the Lord is not to be paralyzed by failure. Nobody has a 100% success rate in his or her missionary work. We need to be sure that we do our best and then to move on. The point is to learn to shake that dust away and move on.

In daily life, if we let dust accumulate, it can get into the pores of skin, make us sick, immobilize us, fill our lungs. Before this dust makes us sick, we need to shake the dust away and move to other towns. There are other towns, other opportunities, other people waiting to hear the Gospel and receive Christ's truth.

We have a mission and few means to accomplish it; hang on to the walking stick; the trust in the providence of God. We need trustful spiritual companions and fellowship with our Christian family which support each other in prayer. Do not be paralyzed by success or failure. But rejoice in the Lord.

May I not rejoice in anything unless it leads me to You, nor be saddened by anything unless it turns me from You. May I not desire to please or fear to displease anyone but You. May all passing things become worthless to me on Your account, and all things that are Yours be dear to me, and You, God, above all things. May all joy without You leave me tired and weary, and may I not desire anything apart from You.

May all work that is done for You delight me, Lord, and all repose not centered on Your presence be wearisome. Let me my God, direct my heart to You often and let me grieve over my failure with determination to change. Make me, my God, humble without pretense, cheerful without frivolity, sad without dejection, mature without heaviness, quick-witted without levity, and truthful without duplicity. Le me fear You without despair, and hope in You without presumption. Let me correct my neighbor without hypocrisy, and without pride edify him by word and example, obedient without contradiction, patient without murmuring.

Give me, dearest God, a vigilant heart which no distracting thought can lure away from You. A noble heart which no unworthy desire can ever debase, an unconquered heart which no tribulation can fatigue, a free heart which no violent temptation can enslave and an upright heart which no perverse intention can hold fast. Grant me, Lord my God, intelligence in knowing You, diligence in seeking You, wisdom in find You, conversation pleasing to You, perseverance in confidently waiting for You, and confidence in finally embracing You.

Grant that as penance I may be afflicted with Your hardships, as grace, make use along the way of Your favors, as glory, delight in Your joys in the fatherland. Amen
