Second Sunday of Advent C

On this second Sunday of Advent, as we look forward to Christmas, all the readings ring with joyous anticipations. They all invite us to imagine the best and then act accordingly. In the first reading the prophet asks the people to change their wardrobe – to throw away the dress of sorrow and distress and wrap of god's integrity around them. We will soon see the glory of the Lord, the splendor of our God. The psalmist asks the people to imagine a time when they will no longer be in bondage sowing in tears but will return full of joy carrying the harvest of goods. St. Paul's letter to the Philippians is filled with promise: "I am confident of this, that the One who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus." Finally, John the Baptist, in the gospel story is travelling around the Jordan district announcing to everyone the day to come when "all mankind shall see the salvation of God."

So we are supposed to be happy and full of hope. But how is it possible? The world is in terrible shape. Every day brings news of more terror, death and destruction. In the shadow of today's headlines, these messages sound hollow. But look more closely at these comforting words. When Baruch writes, Jerusalem has fallen, and people have been carried off into exile. Paul writes from prison. Luke's gospel heightens this paradoxical affirmation of hope despite almost impossible odds. As John the Baptist announces Jesus' coming, Tiberius is emperor, Herod is tetrarch, Annas and Caiaphas are high priests. These men are the mighty and dangerous, the important and powerful people in the world. And who is against them? A desert preacher and an obscure carpenter from a town up north: Could odds have been any worse?

Yet, look what has happened? The centuries have seen the rise and fall of great nations. The Caesars are gone; so are the procurators and tetrarchs and high priests and they have left no marks. Who has survived? What word has lasted? Whose voice endures?

We cannot make light of dangers and disasters that affect us today. But we must not let them defeat us either. But the fact is that there is joy in being Christian or who we are. This joy has its spring deep down in me; "God who is leading Israel in joy" does so "by the power of his Glory" which is Jesus Christ. During this Advent season we read how joy came to Mary and John the Baptist. When God entered into their life, they became joyful. Mary says, "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in the Lord, my Savior. John the Baptist jumped with joy in the womb of his mother as Mary greeted Elizabeth.

That joy of salvation comes from a light that shines in darkness, and it comes from our God, the Word made flesh in the person of Jesus Christ. With the Psalmist we can say, "The Lord has done great things for us, we are filled with joy." It is not the joy of the lighthearted or carefree but the joy that comes from unshakable hope. That light within me can remove the fear of darkness which surrounds me, will wrap me in the cloak of justice, offer me the

peace of justice, fill me with the fruits of righteousness and always says to me "all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

Today's readings give us a few features that can help us to have that joy in our lives. In the first reading Baruch writes, "Jerusalem! Look to the east and see your children gathered from east and west, rejoicing that they are remembered by God." It is a time to return to God. This is a great season for the sacrament of penance, the fresh start that comes to us from Christ. Advent is a chance for us to return to a deeper relationship with Christ which refreshes our joy.

The gospel reading describes a second feature of Advent, the desert, that place apart from the politics, the intrigue and disputes that surround us all year long. That means there should be some time to spend with the Lord in prayer. It is "the water that irrigates everything that we do." This prayer will help us "to make ready the way of the Lord and clear him a straight path" (Lk. 3:4).

Finally, Advent is a time of Gospel light. The lights and colors of the season can remind us to look after the beauty and light of our soul and the quality of our spiritual life. The emphasis on giving gifts can remind us that the power of a gift is not in its cost but the spirit, the care and the friendship it represents.

To conclude our mutual giving should bring our joy into our life and our families together with Jesus who emptied himself on the Christmas day. If we can make one step forward in this line we will have more joy in our lives. This involves the presence of the Lord, unselfish love, giving and forgiving which is unconditional. This brings the joy of Christmas in our families and in our lives. Let us begin with our family and make it a place of joy.
