# **Diocesan Update**

The Diocese will soon close the books on the Bicentennial Campaign and the Catholic Appeal of S.C., with contributions and pledge payments due by Dec. 31. The Good Shepherd parish family has generously supported both projects.

Bicentennial Campaign gifts exceeded our goal of \$220,000 by \$48,000, and 50% of what we have collected so far paid for more than \$107,000 in improvements to the Church, the Rectory, Life Center and more. Outstanding pledges total \$25,000, and half of that amount, when collected, will come back to us for other Parish enhancements.

Your gifts to the Catholic Appeal total **\$21,695**, exceeding our goal by **\$6,282**, half of which will be returned to the parish. Pledges of **\$1,228** are still outstanding.

# The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

Ez 34:11-12, 15-17 | 1 Cor 15:20-26, 28 | Mt 25:31-46

## GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The paradoxical ways we have come to understand Jesus can give us spiritual whiplash. He is both a tender and caring shepherd of sheep and one who sends strong rams and goats to the eternal fire; the executed human and divine man who came into full resurrected glory. He is God incarnate into human history and born in a manger; the servant-leader; the one who is both God and man. This is the beauty of what we call the Paschal Mystery - that the Son of God came into the world and by his life, death, and resurrection he has reconciled us to the Father, and has redeemed us. He saves us from the death of sin. As Catholics we are comfortable with paradox: We are inhabitants of a kingdom of God that is already (here) but not yet (fully realized); we are both an Easter people and we live in a world of Good Fridays. So when Jesus says in today's Gospel that whatever we do to the least of people, we do to Christ himself and we will reap our actions in the fullness of that kingdom, we understand that he is a king unlike any other king. He cares not for pomp and circumstance, but wants to ensure that all - even the least among us - are given his gifts to share. The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe celebrates that we have a king who cares more for us than anyone on earth could ever care for us, and we are blessed to be able to love and serve him in return.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In the midst of our busy lives, it is no secret that our thoughts can easily be preoccupied with things other than prayer or our relationship with God. Perhaps we struggle with maintaining a daily prayer practice. So when we pause to take stock of our lives – where our attention is focused during the day-to-day – it's easy to see that God is sometimes "off to the side." Perhaps we take everything we have been given for granted, or maybe we are just not sure how to make him the most important aspect of our lives. Just like cultivating a friendship takes active effort, so does our relationship with God. Just as watering a plant near its center allows the water to spread throughout the surrounding area, to its roots and the soil – thus making it fruitful and full – putting Jesus Christ, our king, at the center of our lives means that his goodness flows into everything else we say and do. Our lives and our hearts will grow in goodness and bear rich fruit.

**INVITATION** Challenge yourself this week to subvert expectations and keep God first. Show Christ is Lord over your life by prioritizing your faith and building up your priorities around him. Make a daily appointment in your calendar for prayer and look for opportunities to put Christ at the center, or heart, of your daily life.

### CHRIST THE KING A 2023

On the last Sunday of the Liturgical year, the Church celebrates the feast of Christ the King. It was Pius XI who introduced this feast in the Liturgy in 1925.

Both in the Old and New Testaments, several times Christ the Messiah, is presented as a King. In the book of the prophet Micah it is said, "But you, O Bethlehem Ephrata, who are little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days" (5:1). Daniel (7: 13-14), presents Christ as "one coming like a human being ... to him was given dominion and glory and kingship that all peoples, nations and languages should serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed."

In the Annunciation, the angel Gabriel said to Mary: "*The Lord God will make him a king, as his ancestor David was, and he will be the king of the descendants of Jacob forever and his kingdom will never end.*" The magi from the Far East asked the question: "*Where is the baby born to be the king of the Jews?*" On Palm Sunday, the Jews shouted, "*God bless the king, who comes in the name of the Lord.*" There was a board hung over Jesus' head on the cross read: "*Jesus the Nazarene, King of the Jews.*" Today's gospel on the Last Judgment presents Christ the King coming in his heavenly glory to judge us.

This Sunday is dominated by the familiar parable of the sheep and the goats, the very last parable that Jesus told in Matthew's Gospel. It describes a moment when all nations will be gathered together and everyone will be divided into two groups, when Jesus appears as the king and judge of the universe.

Then all the human race gathers for the great judgement, that is, cave men and women, early American Indians, Eskimos, ancient peoples of Africa, Asia, aborigines of Australia, People in New York city, Paris, London, Mexico city, rock stars, lawyers, manual laborers, teachers, computer programmers everyone will appear before God. The Buddhists, the Hindus, the Jewish people and the Muslims, humanists as well as the atheists will have to appear before Jesus of Nazareth. Everyone who ever lived, in the end stands before Jesus Christ. His is the last face all will see before they enter their eternity.

What is the measure by which we will be tested? It is about our love and compassion. Have we cared for the least among us through the corporal and spiritual works of mercy? We will be judged not only for what we did, but as importantly for what we failed to do. In short God's kingdom is based on love and justice.

Many people tried to establish a kingdom based on different principles but they failed. Emperor Napoleon said, King Alexander tried to conquer the world and establish a kingdom; he failed and his kingdom is no more. Roman emperors tried to conquer the world and established a kingdom; they failed and the kingdom is no more. I also tried for the same and failed in my attempt. We all tried with power and sword. But Jesus Christ established a Kingdom founded on truth, justice and love. His Kingdom still present here on earth. Their sin was not only the atrocities and the execution of millions but the fact that they wished to enthrone themselves within the human hearts in the place which belongs to Christ alone. He alone deserves to receive a throne within our hearts. Powerful though he is, he does not win our hearts by force of conquest. Rather he invites us to be the people of his eternal and universal kingdom.

His is a Kingdom, not of deceit and destruction, but of truth and life. It is a Kingdom, not of evil and conceit, but of holiness and grace. It is a Kingdom, not of exploitation, hatred and violence, but of justice, love and peace. We are proud of being called to be the members of his Kingdom where we share his kingship, prophetic life and priestly service. With pride we proclaim to the world, Christ is our King and he is the only one who said to the world that do not be afraid I conquered the world.

History repeats. Even now some people think that they can conquer the world with money or power. People can buy something by their money or do something if they have power. Nobody can buy another person's heart with money or power. If we want to bring Christ's Kingdom to our parish or to our families the place where we work or to our community, take his golden law to that place. "Love one another as I loved you". Let us pray that Christ our King may rule our parish and our families with his love, forgiveness, justice, compassion and care.
