Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Times Cycle C

At first hearing the meaning of the parable seems clear: if you see someone in need or in danger, you should reach out to that person, even at cost to yourself. If that is all it means, then we do not need an explanation or commentary or homily even; the story speaks for itself. At first sight Jesus seems to tell him what means to be a neighbor – to reach out and help. But in a subtle way He tells him who the neighbor is by making him not a fellow Jew but a foreigner, an outsider, a member of a despised ethnic group. In that battered, bleeding man, the Samaritan sees not a Jew but a fellow human being, who desperately needs his help. In the parable Jesus questions His own people's attitude to the Samaritans. He is questioning an attitude that has been taken for granted for hundreds of years, one which is enshrined in tradition and law. Jesus is challenging the lawyer to be disloyal to that tradition. If your religious tradition invites you to despise other people, then you must be disloyal to your tradition. If loving your neighbor means being disloyal to your tradition, then disloyalty becomes a virtue. Ultimately loyalty is love. The parable stands to challenge hate and promote love. And that challenge is always to extend the boundaries of our love to include our traditional enemies. If the gospel does not liberate, then Christ died in vain. He died so that everyone could have life in His name. "Do this and you will live" said Jesus to the teacher, referring to the answer the teacher had just given him. At the end of the reading He says again, "Go and do the same". Those Scribes or teachers of the law love to quote texts as this one does in today's reading. Life is not a theory, or quotation or a piece of scripture. Jesus seems to say this to him. In today's Christianity theology become a university subject, while years back it continued to come in large measure from monasteries. This marks its character profoundly. Spirituality should remain at the heart of theology. What is theology without spirituality? It is just theory or philosophy, and it tends to be unrelated to the lives of most. If then what is theology and spirituality? Theology is that science of God, especially, when the word of God is explained in a particular context of human living. When the words of Christ explained in different life situations different gospels are formed. When it is explained to the Gentiles St. Paul's theology developed. Therefore, we can have different theologies like Paul's theology or John's theology. When theology is assimilated and brought to practice by someone that becomes a way of life or spirituality. That is why we have many spiritualities like, spirituality of St. John of the cross, Therese of Avila, St. Francis of Assisi, St. Benedict, St. Ignatius of Loyola and so on. Theology alone is a theory. The seat of theory is heard but the seat of spirituality is heart. That is why some people say the longest and most difficult road to travel is the road from head to heart. When people begin their journey, they may not be able to move even because of many problems. Holiness of life can never be pushed to the side in theology. "Whoever does not love, does not know God for God is love" (1 Jn. 4:8). Before the Faith was called "Christianity" it was called he way" (Acts 9:9). It is a way of life before it becomes a way of thinking. Jesus is asking the Scribe to do that action in life. According to some church fathers, we can happily retain a great vision that the man lying alienated and helpless by the roadside and God himself becoming man's neighbor in Jesus Christ is a beautiful explanation. Here we are the people who were robbed, beaten and left half dead. Beaten continuously by the habitual sins, greed, hatred, revenge, alienated from the love of God, losing the grace of God received in Baptism. Jesus alone can heal the wounds and bring us back to life. Here we are the wounded and the robbed men, and we are the good Samaritans, and we are the neighbors to others. Both the characters are important in our lives. The principles of holiness and of eternal life – the love God and the love of neighbor- are universal and ageless. The way to holiness and the path eternal life run right through the place where we live The lawyer's question was "Just, who is my neighbor?" The Lord's answer to him and to us is, "Don't worry about that. Just be a neighbor to the person in need who crosses your path." Father Jacob Joseph

Subject: Good Shepherd 2025 - 2026 Budget

The Finance Council has completed the 2025-2026 budget. The budget is attached with a breakdown of category Revenue vs Expenses.

The current 2024-25 budget year ending June 30, 2025, required the annual contributions to meet expenses to be \$276,625.00 and is estimated we will exceed that amount by \$52,000

Based on our assessments and adjustment to revenue and operating expenses, the 2025-2026 budget beginning July 1, 2025 will require contributions to meet the projected operating expenses to be \$6,031.00 per week. The contribution increase will cover the following: Diocese Administrative Fees, General Liability and Property Insurance increases, Pastoral Salary, Retirement and Insurance increases. In addition to Rectory Improvements.

The budget has been submitted to the Diocese of Charleston.
